17.9. - ISS and CITY HALL TOUR, LUNCH and TOUR GEORGIAN COLLEGE, CITY HALL


At 8:00 AM, we met at Innisdale Secondary School (ISS), where we were shown around the building.

1st October: Ottawa




On Monday, October 1st, we started our big trip to Ottawa early in the morning. After a few hours we arrived in Canada's capital.

After that we went to the National War Memorial. We also had some free time in Ottawa we used to go shopping or got something to eat.










Later that day we checked in to our hotel and went out to ,,3 Brewers" restaurant, where we had a very nice dinner.
